




KEY PROJECTS:

OUR WORK

Working in partnership with the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology we introduced the National Education Standards to classrooms and communities to create sustainable, lasting change.

- At the community level, we raised awareness of the Standards and helped parents and communities to hold their local school accountable for delivering quality education to their children.
 Targeted work with marginalised groups amplified their voices to advocate especially for vulnerable children's needs, ensuring no child was left behind.
- In schools, we provided training in the Standards and school management, and supported the development of School Improvement Plans.
- We helped improve school inspection and planning, supporting government to implement the Standards in schools and across whole districts using accurate data.

teachers trained in evidence-based school improvement planning Located in rural Mchinji, Sitoro is home to 1,400 pupils and 20 teachers. Before working with Link, no-one was sure when the school was last inspected, despite inspections being crucial to guide improvement in teaching and support for children. Internal learner assessment was flagged as an area for concern. With our support. Sitoro implemented the School Performance Review process and improved teacher training; invested in learning and teaching materials; and identified problem areas. The school has now improved against the learner assessment Standard and has moved up to the next level!
